with an ABC team member who will come speak to your junior and/or senior class about the blood donation process and how to run a successful blood drive.

build a super committee of government leaders, faculty members, and club representatives to recruit donors within your school and community and publicize your upcoming drive.

Generate Publicity and Create Excitement

about the upcoming drive by encouraging the use of social media. As the drive coordinator, you and/or your club members can launch a social media/text blast to all friends and classmates encouraging them to donate blood at your high school drive.

Benefits of Power Red

In traditional blood donations, donors give whole blood which consists of red cells, plasma and platelets. Using the automated process, donors can give a specific component in greater quantities than can be collected during a whole blood donation. When you donate <code>Power Red</code> you will be donating TWO UNITS OF RED CELLS during one sitting.

By knowing daily patient needs and using automated blood collection technologies, we can tailor your blood donation to local hospital demands. When customizing your donation we consider your blood type and how many times per year you donate.

Power Red Donation Process

During your donation, blood is drawn from one arm and channeled through a sterile, single-use tubing set to an automated system. This system separates the components and collects a measured amount of red blood cells into a special bag then safely returns the remaining components.

A Safe Procedure

Donor safety is our top priority. Automated collections are very safe. The technology uses a sterile system with a disposable needle and is designed to customize the products collected from you.

How Automated Donations Help Patients

Red blood cells, which carry oxygen to all parts of the body, are most needed after significant blood loss as a result of surgery or anemia. Donors can donate double red blood cells every 16 weeks. Donors with Type O negative blood are especially needed because Type O negative blood is the universal blood type and it can be transfused to any patient.

Your **Power Red** Donation Makes a Difference

Oxygen-rich red blood cells are most often used for surgery, anemia, or trauma patients. Donors who donate just their red blood cells through automation can double the amount of red blood cells donated at one time. There is a 112-day deferral period between these double red cell donations and donors are eligible to give only three of these automated red cell donations per year.
